The second most important issue is the 100% staffing of our public safety forces of the Police and Fire Departments, there is no reason not to satisfy our primary responsibility of public safety. The most understaffed department is our Ordinance Department. It is next to impossible to maintain our control a first class community with (4) full time and (2) part time officers, most of the time and slightly more with (3) or (3) students in the Summer. We are aCity of 24,000 house holds with a population of 57- 58.000 persons; where the City of Dearborn is double our size they employ about (3) times as many employees, This ratio must be increased for us.</p>	<p>I guess this question was answered above I would be repeating myself, with one exception. In General it is true that Municipal employees have excellent benefit programs such as Medical and Defined Pension Programs, which many industrial workers now longer have and are losing. It is also true they also have better job security. The price for these advantages is a lower compensation level with little and few increases very infrequently in compensation for most of our employees. A compensation analysis with one of our appropriate consultant firms when our finance have stabilized be commissioned, after we have created a "Rainy Day Fund"of 20% of the Cities budget of 45 million dollars our (9) million dollars.</p>	<p>All home sales must registered, as to the date of their Certificate of Occupancy, They are categorized into two groups that have the Homestead exemption and those that do not. I have always advocated partnering with other communities to share in the cost of city services. The city of Dearborn Heights entered into an agreement with Garden City for fire protection. The city of Dearborn Heights was part of a five community study conducted by the National Center for State Courts to examine the feasibility of combining district court services to more fully utilize the Dearborn Heights Justice Center. The City of Dearborn Heights must find ways to provide city services in a more efficient, cost effective manner. The City's property tax rate has to be kept low to attract people to Dearborn Heights to buy houses and start small businesses.</p>	<p>City residents deserve good quality police and fire protection. The city of Dearborn Heights must be a safe place to live and to work. Neighborhoods in the city must be patrolled. Property owners must know that their property and their family are safe. City streets and city infrastructure must be maintained. The city needs to provide low cost water and sewer service for it's residents. Adequate funds need to be allocated to insure safe drinking water, and to end sewer back up. Recently, the city of Dearborn Heights created a separate ordinance enforcement department, to insure commercial and residential properties are maintained and kept up to code. The city also must properly fund recreational services for our seniors and our children. I believe that funds need to be spent first on keeping our community safe and on maintaining our commercial and residential properties. The rental homes must be inspected and kept up to code. The homes must have a current certificate of occupancy, issued by the City in the renter's name. Some landlords try to hide the fact that they are renting the houses they own. The rental ordinances the City of Dearborn Heights currently have on the books need to be strictly enforced. The penalties for violation of the City's rental and housing ordinances have to be increased so that a Landlord is forced to register his properties with the City and keep the properties in compliance with the city code.</p>

My recommendation to the Administration and the Council would be to conduct a complete review of the current ordinances to validate that the existing regulations contain appropriate rules and oversight to properly govern the rental market and to make the changes necessary to update any ordinance found to be less than sufficient. I will work with the Building Dept. to understand the reoccurring issues with rental homes in the City and then work to develop policies and programs that increase owner accountability and improve adherence to the rental property ordinances of Dearborn Heights.</p>


